The Polish Round Table Agreement

April 4th is the twenty-first anniversary of the signing of the Polish Round Table Agreement between the Polish communist

government and the trade union Solidarność. The Agreement reinvigorated the cascade of events that would bring true independence to Poland after 50 years of oppression, and to the rest



of Eastern Europe, eventually leading to the dissolution of the Soviet Union itself.

The Talks took place in Warsaw from February 6 to April 4, 1989 and were initiated by the Polish government to defuse mounting social unrest. After Solidarność was suppressed with the imposition of martial law from 1981 until 1983, and the subsequent general amnesty of 1986, an economic malaise and runaway inflation reduced the living standards of Poles and deepened public anger and frustration. Support for the banned Solidarność union continued unabated despite the best efforts of the communist government to suppress it. The government gambled that by initiating the Talks they would be able to control and steer the results to those more to its liking. However, this would not prove to be the case.

The Agreement signed on April 4th accomplished many revolutionary acts for a communist country: legalization of

trade unions; creation of the office of President (no longer would the Communist Party General Secretary be the de facto head of state); creation of a bicameral congress with the

creation of a Senate. The Communist Party reserved for itself 65% of the seats in the Sejm; the remainder of the Sejm and the entire Senate would be freely elected.

Solidarność became a legitimate and legal political party and the elections on June 4, 1989 brought a landslide victory to Solidarność. The people of Poland gave it 99% of all the seats in the new Senate and all the 35% freely elected seats in the Sejm, thereby making Solidarność the de facto government. The 65-35% division was soon abolished as well. Poland was finally free of communism. By November 9th the Berlin Wall fell and on December 12, 1991 the Soviet Union was no more.

The History of Polish Cinema

There is no shortage of Poles in the early history of cinema. There was a permanent cinema in Łódź as early as 1899



and prior to that several Poles already had been shooting short documentary films. The first Polish feature film, *Antoś po raz pierwszy w Warszawie*, was

released in 1908. In that same year *Pruska kultura* was filmed. It is the oldest surviving Polish film, only recently rediscovered in Paris in 2000.

After Poland gained independence, movie theatres opened all over Poland and many silent films were made which were adaptations of popular Polish literary works. This interwar period saw the development of associations and cooperative film societies whose aim was to produce “socially useful” films, including documentaries.

During the Second World War, Polish film production was prohibited and many Polish filmmakers found themselves outside Poland. This exile did, however, allow them to produce many patriotic films which helped with the war effort by bringing the plight of the Poles to a Western audience.

News From Poland

The ruling **Civic Platform** party (PO) will hold preliminary elections to select a candidate for the presidency between two potential candidates: Foreign Affairs Minister **Radosław Sikorski** or lower house of Parliament's Speaker **Bronisław Komorowski**.

The leader of the **PiS**, **Jarosław Kaczyński**, the twin brother of the Polish President, declared that he knows some facts that should disqualify **Radosław Sikorski** as a presidential candidate, but he is not going to disclose them.

Poland's economy is expected to grow by 2.5–3% in 2010, according to a revised forecast by the World Bank.

Polish labor is the sixth cheapest among the EU member states, with the monthly cost of one Polish employee's labor amounting to EUR 1,105 (approx. \$1,500).

Commemorations in the Holy Cross Church in Warsaw, in which **Fryderyk Chopin's** heart is buried, officially launched Chopin's 200th birthday anniversary.

Cross-country skier **Justyna Kowalczyk** finished the season by winning almost everything in her discipline – the prestigious



Tour de Ski, three Olympic medals (gold, silver and bronze) and the World Cup. Her gold medal was the only one for Poland and she contributed three of the total of six 2010 Olympic Medals for Poland.

Polish Cinema continues

After the war, the communist government used film for its own propaganda purposes and made the industry its exclusive domain. Along with this monopolization came censorship and the quality of the films dropped correspondingly.

After Stalin's death in 1955, a breath of fresh air made its way through the Polish film industry with relaxed censorship. Soon a group of talented filmmakers arose that took this freedom and produced quality films that spoke to the core feelings and mood of the Polish people. These films were well received by the West where they won numerous awards. A "Polish School" in film was internationally recognized, with Andrzej Wajda being its outstanding talent. He excelled at "films offering insightful analyses of the universal element of the Polish experience - the struggle to maintain dignity under the most trying circumstances."

The 1960s saw monumental historical costume productions of classical Polish literary works; but at the same time many of the early pioneers of the "Polish School" either died or fled to the West, most notably Roman Polanski. Wajda, however, resisted the call of the West and remains active in Poland to this day. One of his most recent films is *Katyn*, a film about the Soviet massacre of Polish World War II officers, one of whom was Wajda's own father.

After the establishment of democracy in Poland, filmmaking no longer had the constraints of government censorship and oppression to work against; and much of the genre is now inspired by the American movie, with only a few outstanding films to the contrary.

200 Years of Fryderyk Chopin

“When the first notes of Chopin sound through the concert hall, there is a happy sigh of recognition. When I play Chopin, I know I speak directly to the hearts of people.”

—Arthur Rubinstein



Marking the bicentenary of Fryderyk Chopin’s birth, the year 2010 is billed as the Chopin Year. Chopin was one of the most original of all composers. Intimate and poetic, the music of Fryderyk Chopin is almost universal.

Fryderyk Chopin, the greatest of the Polish composers, was born in Zelazowa Wola, near Warsaw, on February 22, 1810 of a French father and a Polish mother. He spent the first 20 years of his life in Warsaw, where he was able to hear many of the premier artists of the time perform. Chopin first studied piano at the Warsaw Conservatory and became proficient on the instrument by the time he reached his early teens. He played his first concert at the age of 7, and was a published composer by the time he turned 15.

By the late 1820s, Chopin had won a great reputation as a piano virtuoso and composer. He toured throughout Europe to the acclaim of audiences and critics alike. In 1831, after performing in Paris, he fell so deeply in love with the city that he made it his home, and never again returned to Warsaw. He soon became a favorite of the Parisian salons and the society elite; and throughout the years that he lived in Paris, he was always in great demand as both a pianist and a teacher.

In the late 1830s, Chopin met the novelist, Mme. Aurore Dudévant, who used the pen name George Sand. They began a relationship that would prove to

be both the most influential and devastating event of his life. By 1847 their highly-charged relationship had ended, leaving Chopin heartbroken.

He continued to create music but soon became ill and died suddenly on October 17, 1849, at the age of only 39. According to legend, there has never been a day when fresh flowers were not placed on his grave at Père-Lachaise.

The Polish American Cultural Institute of Minnesota, along with The Saint Paul Conservatory of Music and Wells Piano, marked this anniversary with a concert, *Celebrating 350 Years of Chopin & Paderewski*, on February 28th at Holy Cross Church. Seven young talented professionals representing The Saint Paul Conservatory of Music and other important local studios played the music of Chopin and Paderewski exclusively. The performance included explanatory readings of the life and times of Chopin and Paderewski and insight into their complex music.

The Russian Pianist, Denis Evstuhin, who has performed at some of the world’s most prestigious venues, concluded the concert with Chopin’s “Heroic” Polonaise in A flat Major. Joining him in order of appearance were: Andy Tseng, Arthur Tseng, Sophia Kor Benjamin Osterhouse, William Yang, James Brockhurst and Michele Zhang.

Russian pianist Denis Evstuhin was born in 1981 in St. Petersburg and started his musical training at the age of five. He has performed in major cities and venues throughout the world and has also appeared on radio and television in Russia, Europe and the United States. He is a laureate of numerous prestigious international piano competitions.

Mr. Evstuhin holds a B.M. and M.M. from the St. Petersburg Conservatory. While in the U.S., he received his Artist Diploma from Hamline University in St. Paul, Minnesota. He continues to work with Professor Alexander Braginsky and is currently pursuing a D.M.A. in Piano Performance at the University of Minnesota.

Mr. Evstuhin, who first performed at TMORA to an enthusiastic full house in July 2009, organized “Music at the Museum,” a ‘series’ featuring a wide range of Russian classics, and serves as its Artistic Director.

Cross Country Skier

Justyna was born in 1983 in Limanowa. She now makes her home in Katowice. She has been competing since the year 2000. She has four Olympic medals and was the first Pole to receive an Olympic medal in cross-country skiing. She has also previously won the Cross-Country Skiing World Cup and the Tour de Ski. On March 24, 2009, Kowalczyk was awarded Poland's Knight's Cross of the Order of "Polonia Restituta." She is the only cross-country skier in history who can claim all the Big Crown wins.
